**Germs: The Good! The Bad! The Ugly!**

Many people are confused between viral and bacterial illnesses. How are these illnesses spread? How are they treated? How are they different? Let's examine these factors and learn effective ways to keep our bodies healthy and happy.

Bacteria are tiny, single-celled organisms that survive by getting nutrients from their environments. This includes human beings; but, many can grow on non-living surfaces as well. Some bacteria are good; and can aide with digestion or be used to produce medicine and vaccines. Other bacteria are not so good, and can cause infections, such as strep throat or urinary tract infections, requiring treatments with antibiotics.

Viruses need living cells to survive. Some viruses can live for a very short time outside a living host, on surfaces like countertops and doorknobs. Viruses spread quickly and once they have entered a body, they are responsible for illnesses like colds and flus. They are also responsible for serious diseases like small pox and HIV. Antibiotics are not effective against viruses, but there are antiviral agents which do help treat selective viruses.

All germs can be spread through the air in sneezes or coughs, or through any body fluid like sweat, saliva, blood, etc. Once germs enter the body, they derive all their energy from the host. They can damage or destroy healthy cells, and may produce proteins known as toxins. Toxins can cause the annoying symptoms of a cold or a more serious complication, such as fever and inflammation.

Protect yourself from a germ invasion. Hand washing is the single, most effective way to prevent the spread of germs. Wash your hands with warm soapy water for at least 20 seconds whenever you have contaminated your hands such as after coughing, nose blowing, using the bathroom, touching pets or animals, gardening, or coming into contact with an ill person. Also washing hands before eating and before and after preparing foods help protect you from harmful bacteria. Make sure you and your children's immunizations are up to date as well. These small simple steps can make a big difference in keeping you healthy and happy!

### **Building Positive Teacher-Child Relationships**

Building positive relationships with young children is an essential task and a foundational component of good teaching. All children grow and thrive in the context of close and dependable relationships that provide love and nurturance, security, and responsive interactions. A positive adult-child relationship built on trust, understanding, and caring will foster children's cooperation and motivation and increase their positive outcomes at school (Webster-Stratton, 1999).

In early childhood settings, each moment that teachers and children interact with one another is an opportunity to develop positive relationships. It is important for teachers to use developmentally and individually appropriate strategies that take into consideration children's differing needs, interests, styles, and abilities.

In developing positive teacher-child relationships, it is important to remember to:

- ✓ Engage in one-to-one interactions with children
- ✓ Get on the child's level for face-to-face interactions
- ✓ Use a pleasant, calm voice and simple language
- ✓ Provide warm, responsive physical contact
- ✓ Follow the child's lead and interest during play
- ✓ Help children understand classroom expectations
- ✓ Redirect children when they engage in challenging behavior
- ✓ Listen to children and encourage them to listen to others
- ✓ Acknowledge children for their accomplishments and effort

When developing relationships with young children, teachers should pay attention to the cultural, linguistic, and individual needs of the children. The importance of adapting strategies to meet the unique needs of the children and families in a teacher's care cannot be overstated.

Exciting News! We are very pleased to announce that we will be implementing the WV Elements of Family Child Care Series (WV EFCCS) using *The Creative Curriculum for Family Child Care* and *The Family Child Care Environment Rating Scale-Revised*. The WV EFCCS is sponsored by the WV Department of Health and Human Resources Division of Early Care and Education.


The WV EFCCS aligns with the West Virginia State Training and Registry System (WV STARS) Core Knowledge and Core Competencies and consists of a 30-hour training program. This seven part series, presented in 4-hour sessions, will provide a comprehensive overview of *The Creative Curriculum for Family Child Care* and how to use *The Family Child Care Environment Rating Scale-Revised*.

The seven sessions focus on:

1. Building a Firm Foundation
2. Knowing How Children Learn
3. Organizing Your Day
4. What Children Are Learning (Part 1)
5. What Children Are Learning (Part 2)
6. Caring and Teaching
7. Building a Partnership with Families

This training will guide you in making substantive changes in your family child care program that will improve the quality of early education for the children in your care. We anticipate that the training will be held in the early summer months in whichever county has the most response. Participants will be required to register on the WV STARS Career Pathway. Guidance and support will be provided to the participants to register on the WV STARS Pathway. The **30 hour, WV STARS registered training** program includes 28 hours of classroom instruction connected with 2 hours of on-site technical assistance visits. (This will **provide 2 years of training hours**). In addition, caregivers are guided in developing a professional portfolio and using the FCCERS-R tool. At the end of the series, the participants will also be provided with materials and supplies of their choice in the amount of **\$300.00** to enhance their Family Child Care environment.

## TODD'S BEHAVIOR TOOLBOX

Bullying is a major concern in our schools and something most individuals experience at one time or another. Bullying is emotional or physical abuse that is defined by a deliberate intention to hurt someone, repeated acts against a victim, and an imbalance of power between the aggressor and the victim. Types of bullying are physical bullying, verbal bullying, and indirect bullying which includes ignoring or excluding certain people from the group, spreading rumors, and telling lies about someone to hurt them. The increased access young people have to computers and cell phones has led to a rise in cyber bullying. Cyber bullying involves sending hurtful messages using the internet, cell phones, or other digital communication devices.

The foundation for bullying prevention begins with teaching children problem solving skills, the ability to share voluntarily, assertiveness, and the ability to feel empathy for others. When children are taught these skills at an early age, they are less likely to bully others as they get older and they are also more likely to intervene in the event they witness another individual being bullied. Children that are passive and lack confidence are often targeted as victims. Teaching children to be assertive can help them avoid being perceived as an easy target. Bullying is often encouraged through the actions of the bystanders that are present. Bystanders encourage bullying to continue by prodding the bully, laughing or cheering, joining in themselves, or passively watching the bullying and doing nothing to stop it. Most bullying stops within minutes when bystanders intervene to help the victim. When children are able to feel empathy for others they are less likely to ignore situations in which they may be able to help. By intentionally teaching young children problem solving skills, assertiveness, sharing, and empathy, perhaps bullying will be less likely to occur in the future.

## West Virginia Training Certificate in Early Care and Education Awarded to WVU Early Learning Center Professionals

WV STARS would like to recognize Carolyn Mitchell of Morgantown, West Virginia and Lisa Loughery of Fairview, West Virginia for receiving the West Virginia Training Certificate in Early Care and Education.

The certificate was awarded to Carolyn, an infant teacher at WVU Early Learning Center, on December 20, 2012. Carolyn has completed over 318 training hours in the last five years to receive the certificate.

Lisa was awarded the certificate on January 11, 2013 after she completed over 200 training hours in the last five years. Lisa is currently a teacher of toddlers at WVU Early Learning Center in Morgantown, West Virginia.

The West Virginia Training Certificate in Early Care and Education is a certificate offered to WV STARS Career Pathway participants who have attended an extensive amount of training hours in a variety of content areas. In order to be eligible for the WVTCECE, an individual must possess an active Career Pathway certificate and have attended 120 clock hours of WV STARS Registered Training in the past five years. The training hours must be reflected on the Professional Development Record and be completed in a variety of Core Knowledge Content Areas.

Due to recent changes, the WVTCECE is easier than ever to achieve. Previously, WVTCECE applicants could only use training hours they have completed with an active Career Pathway certificate. New changes to the policy allows for applicants to submit WV STARS Training Certificates taken up to five years prior to be eligible for the WVTCECE, regardless of when you may have applied for the Career Pathway certificate.

Recipients must complete 20 clock hours of training in each of the following Core Knowledge Content Areas: Area 1 Child Growth and Development, Area 2 Health, Safety and Nutrition, Area 3 Positive Interactions and Relationships, Area 4 Curriculum, and Area 5 Child Observation and Assessment. Along with the 100 clock hours completed in the first five Core Knowledge Content Areas, an additional five hours of training in each of the following areas must be completed: Area 6 Family and Community, Area 7 Program Management, and Area 8 Professionalism. An additional five clock hours of training must be completed in any of the eight Core Knowledge Content Areas.

To apply for the West Virginia Training Certificate in Early Care and Education, interested parties should submit the WVTCECE Request Form with copies of WV STARS Certificates of Training Attendance to WV STARS. ## Infant/Toddler News

Happy Spring!

During the first few years of life, infants and toddlers are trying to make sense of their world. One of the ways they do this is by soaking up every noise, every sound, and every experience that they have. They then take this information and come up with ideas about how the world works. So, not only is being outdoors an enjoyable experience for infants and toddlers, it's critical for cognitive development. During the first three years of life, brain synapses form at a rapid rate. These synapses are formed based on the richness of the child's sensory environment. So, it would make sense that childcare providers would want to provide a stimulating environment for infants and toddlers, both indoors and outdoors. Not only does outdoor experiences provides a foundation to literacy and science learning, but is also critical for infant and toddler physical development.

Outdoor play has many added health benefits aside from the stimulating environment that supports developmental growth.

### Environmental Health

- Children learn about nature and caring for the environment from direct experiences
- Children become involved in the task of caring for the environment and keeping it healthy

### Spiritual Health

- Aesthetic and spiritual meaning and satisfaction
- Tranquility
- Beauty and peace

### Mental and Emotional Health

- Independence
- Stress reduction among children, teachers, parents, and teachers
- Higher parent satisfaction with the program
- Increased job satisfaction and retention of staff

### Physical Health:

- Active play
- Physical development
- Physical fitness
- Large muscle development
- Sunlight that provides a source of Vitamin D
- Fresh air exchange with less risk for germs which cause illness

Remember that the experiences that infants and toddlers have outdoors while they are in child care, may in fact, be the only opportunity they have to really explore the outdoors. By taking infants and toddlers outdoors, you are providing wonderful opportunity and you are setting up a good model for parents to follow. If children learn to love being outdoors when they are young, it will make them healthier. It will also help ensure that they will take better care of our world when they are adults.

# Child and Adult Care Food Program

Dear Providers,

Happy Spring! It is with pleasure that we support your choice to provide high quality child care in your home.

The Child and Adult Care Food Program regulation requires that each Family Day Care Home Provider receives three (3) hours of training every year. Child and Adult Care Food Program year begins October 1<sup>st</sup> and end September 30<sup>th</sup> of every year. **CCWVA, CACFP will not accept trainings from other agencies to fulfill the three (3) hour training requirement.**

**The trainings begin promptly at the times listed on your training schedule. If you are late for the training, you will not be permitted to attend and will have to make arrangements to attend another scheduled training. Cell phones will need to be turned off or on vibrate mode during the training. Please do not text on your phone during the training.**

**Failure to comply with the required hours will result in you being seriously deficient in the operation of your FDCH. This could lead to closure from the Child and Adult Car Food Program for seven (7) years.**

In order to register for the CCWVA, CACFP training you will need to contact the nutrition monitor listed beside each training location.

If you are registered on the STARS Career Pathway, you will need either your STARS label or number on the sign in sheet. If the information is not provided the day of the training, you will not receive STARS credit.

Feel free to bring a snack or refreshment with you to the training. These items **will not** be provided at the training by CCWVA, CACFP.
