
## A Word from the Director

### Summer is a Time for Safety

Summer is just around the corner. The days are longer and warmer which means lots of time for outdoor play. Kids love playing outside in the summer and it's a great time for them to increase physical activity. It's also a time to take some precautions to keep kids safe during the summer months.

First, be sure to protect children from the burning effects of the sun. Studies have shown that getting a sunburn as a child increases the risk of developing skin cancer as an adult. Sun screen for children older than six months is a must. Sunscreens should be applied 30 minutes before going outdoors and should have a sun protection factor (SPF) of at least 15 or higher. For infants six months or less, keep them out of direct sun and/or use clothing to protect them from the sun's rays.

Insects such as mosquitos, ticks and bees can be a summertime annoyance but can also lead to more serious conditions such as anaphylaxis and Lyme disease. For children older than 2 months the best defense against mosquitos and ticks is to apply an insect repellent with no more than 30% DEET. Check children for ticks after coming in from outdoor play. Also, keep playgrounds free of standing water and keep the grass cut regularly. Bee stings are one of the most common causes of severe allergic reactions in children. Light colored clothing helps to keep bees away and the use of scented soaps or perfumes should be avoided. Do not leave food, drink or garbage uncovered outdoors. If a child who has been stung begins to have swelling around the mouth or tongue or complains of tightness in the throat and seems to have difficulty breathing, call 911 immediately.

Playing in water is a favorite summer activity but requires close supervision. Children can drown in less than 2 inches of water so even small pools of water can be hazardous. When children are playing in or around water an adult should always be within arm's length. Never leave children alone around water and avoid distractions when supervising children water.

Finally, the use of trampolines has been deemed too dangerous for children by the American Academy of Pediatrics. There are over 100,000 trampoline injuries every year, many of them serious. Safety nets have not been shown to reduce the number of injuries. Young children are at greatest risk and should not be allowed to use trampolines.

With a few precautions, summer can be fun and safe for everyone.

## The Apprenticeship for Child Development Specialist




### ACDS Instructors Academy

## Questions & Answers

We have received a lot of questions from providers and have decided that if one provider has a question there could be others out there who are in need of an answer as well.

**Question:**

Where can I get details on the payments that I receive since I no longer receive a paper check?

**Answer:**

FACTS PLUS is a free internet service that allows providers to view information about child care payments made through FACTS including child information and processing dates. The website for FACTS PLUS is <https://facts.wvdhhr.org/factsplus>

**Question:**

I received notice that I had a mistake on my billing forms, why can't the worker just correct the error and process the billing?

**Answer:**

Payment forms are official invoices and staff shall not alter forms once they have been signed by the provider, even upon request. Please make sure to check all attendance and request for payment forms before submitting to CCRC. If you would like to receive a billing refresher training please contact your local CCRC Office.

**Question:**

I cared for children on a holiday; do I get the nontraditional rate?

**Answer:**

No. Nontraditional child care hours are defined as

- a. Approved care for four (4) hours either before 6am or after 7pm Monday through Friday.
- b. Approved care for at least four (4) hours on a Saturday or Sunday
- c. Any 12 hour work/school shift or split shift which equals twelve or more care hours in a 24 hour period.

### **In The Good Old Summertime**

Summer is a very exciting and fun time for infants and toddlers to enjoy the outdoors. It is a time for children to engage in active play and explore the natural world.

Research indicates that playing outside improves the health of young children: For example:

- Young children are more likely to engage in the kinds of physical play that strengthens their heart, lungs, and muscles when they are outside. Vigorous physical activity improves a child's overall health.
- Spending time outdoors strengthens young children's immune systems.
- The outdoors is an easy way to get vitamin D through a few minutes of sunshine each day.
- Spending time outdoors positively affects young children's sleeping patterns. According to Naturopathic Health Foundations, natural sunlight helps regulate and balance sleep-wake cycles.
- Children who play outside are less likely to be nearsighted. Direct exposure to the bright, natural light that comes from being outside may stimulate developing eyes in important ways such as "maintaining the correct distance between the lens and the retina-which keeps vision in focus" as stated by Aamodt and Chang in "Sun is Best Optometrist."
- Time spent outdoors provides children with a general sense of well-being and peace.
- The American Academy of Microbiology says that there is some evidence that playing in the dirt exposes children to a specific type of bacteria that may reduce anxiety and improve the ability to learn new tasks

In conclusion, the outdoors offers important health and developmental benefits, as well as, valuable experiences which are not available indoors. Take advantage of the beautiful weather and have a great summer!!




**Early Childhood Education Scholarship Availability Announcement**

## News from the **TRAILS** Room

### Have Fun with Water Play!

Water play is a great way to extend open-ended learning both indoors and outside with young children. Water play fosters learning in all developmental areas. It provides opportunities for children to experiment with math and science concepts, strengthen their physical skills, advance their social and emotional skills, and enhance language development (Crosser, 1994; Hendrick, 1996).

- Find an old paint brush. Put water in a bucket. Let children “paint” the sidewalk, fence, or house with water.
- Fill a dishpan or bucket with water. Find several plastic cups. Toddlers love pouring water from cup to cup.
- Fill water in a child-sized watering can for children to water flowers or to pour in a water table.
- Sensory bottles are a great way to do water play with babies, fill them with beads, buttons, small toys, glitter etc. you can color the water for a different effect as well. \*Make sure bottle lids are secure to prevent them from being opened. Babies can shake, rattle and roll the bottles and explore sound!
- 

Put different color/shape sponges in the water and have children observe what happens! Ask: How does the weight of the sponge change? What about the color? What happens to the water level?

## Sizzling Summer Sensory Skills

Summer is finally upon us and after such a long, cold, blustery winter many of us are more than ready to jump into some warm summer fun.

The great outdoors is just the place for children to explore and expand their developmental skills. At no other season of the year do we live as intimately with nature as we do in the summer. All of our senses are stimulated, opening up endless opportunities to nurture sensory development in children of all ages.

Take advantage of the mild temperatures and take children outdoors. Have children focus on the things they hear, see, feel, and smell. For example, on a sunny day talk about the shadows they see and play a game of shadow tag (chasing each other's shadows and stepping on the shadow to tag the child as "it"). On a rainy day, sit outside or near a window and talk about the sounds the raindrops make as they bounce off of the sidewalk, trees, cars, and puddles. Listen to the wind and watch how it moves the leaves in the trees and flowers on the ground. Listen for the sounds of animals and insects: birds, crickets, dogs, cats, etc. Talk about how the sounds and sights of nature are the same and different on a still hot day... on a windy day... on a rainy day... with your ear to the ground, etc.

Get out, explore, and ENJOY!



## Todd's Toolbox

Summer is finally here! The warm weather signals the end of the school year and you may be welcoming school-age children into your home or center. Many child care providers report difficulties in keeping school-age children engaged throughout the day and see behavior issues arise. Here are some tips and strategies to ensure that the school-age children in your care have a safe and positive experience.

- Establish a few simple rules for your program. Allow the children to participate in selecting the rules if possible.
- Create an indoor space with clear activity choices. Possible activity areas include art, science, home, construction, and snack.
- Establish boundaries and rules for playing outside. Require children to use playground equipment in the manner it was designed to be used. Create some interest areas outside such as a sand and water table and have outdoor equipment like balls and Frisbees available.
- Work to build positive relationships with each child by talking with them regularly, giving sincere compliments, and showing a sense of humor.
- Plan activities with older children in mind, and involve them when planning activities.
- Supervise children carefully. Move closer to children that appear to be moving towards unacceptable behavior. Redirect behavior before it gets out of control.
- Acknowledge children when you see them engaging in positive behavior. Attention is often placed on negative behaviors. Moving attention to positive behaviors can lead these behaviors to increase.
